


Epro8

On August 11th, Nelson Intermediate School hosted the Inter-whānau Epro8 Challenge. This stands as an engaging inter-school competition that encourages science and engineering skills. Each year, the event draws over 25,000 students from across New Zealand. The outcome of this challenge holds the key to determining the two teams that will progress to the inter-school competition scheduled for August 30th. The teams presented by our school's whānau showcased impressive strength, a fact underscored by the high calibre of projects on display.



Each participating group received an identical toolkit comprising an assortment of tools and materials. This toolkit aimed to aid them in accomplishing their designated tasks. Furthermore, a specific guideline was provided, requiring them to craft something that could fulfil multiple functions. Their creations were evaluated against this criteria, with points being allocated for each successfully executed task. The competition spanned the entire day and encompassed three distinct challenges: the creation of a dunking mechanism, a functional certificate conveyor belt, and a fully operational well, complete with a
