At Nelson Intermediate we strive to provide a nurturing, caring and inclusive environment. We aim to do this by proactively teaching our school values, and ensuring that the needs of each ākonga are catered to.

As the year has progressed we are starting to notice an increase in antisocial behavior, particularly amongst some of our female ākonga. Beyond the immediate disruption it causes, antisocial behaviour can have profound implications on the well-being of ākonga and the entire school community.

Antisocial behavior, whether it's bullying, exclusion, or harassment, can lead to emotional distress, anxiety, and a decline in mental health. It creates an atmosphere where ākonga may feel unsafe and unwelcome, hindering their ability to thrive academically and socially. We must recognise that the consequences of antisocial behaviour extend far beyond the surface. It erodes trust, fractures relationships, and damages the sense of belonging that every student should feel within our school and community.

Our school takes a proactive stance against antisocial behaviour. We encourage open communication between ākonga, whānau and kaiako. If your tamaiti witnesses or experiences any form of antisocial behaviour, please don't hesitate to contact us. We have support systems in place to ensure the safety and well-being of all and can offer advice and support for behaviour that happens outside of the school day.

By addressing antisocial behaviour head-on and promoting a culture of respect and empathy, we not only improve the overall atmosphere but also safeguard the mental and emotional well-being of our students. Let's stand together against antisocial behaviour, working collaboratively to create a supportive and inclusive environment where everyone can flourish.

Māori Language Week 2023

E te kāhui o te Kura Tūwaenga o Whakatū, tēnā koutou.


Te Pītau Whakarei

Tēnā koutou,

Ka puāwai ngā kōwhai he tohu tēnā kua aroaromahana! Nau mai hoki mai, spring time.

Term 3 has flown by with days being consumed almost as quickly as fried bread at a hui. However, you won't catch Te Pītau Whakarei floating idly at the kai table this term... Our days have been populated with many fun, educational and inspirational activities, some of which we share below.

Earlier in the term, we had Matua Charles, a tā moko expert from Whakatū, come in to share his knowledge with the ākonga. We explored the whakapapa of Māori tattooing and created our own designs, drawing from traditional motifs to represent important things, like whānau and interests. Big thanks to Matua Charles for spending some time with us.





Three of our students also spent three days at Waikawa Marae in Picton, exploring the relationship between science, mātauranga Māori and our lives. They were able to do some cool, hands-on, experiments and got to immerse themselves in the culture of Waikawa Marae.

Finally, kapa haka, in various forms, has taken centre stage in Te Pītau this term. Alongside helping teach the school haka to the rest of the classes, we have been training every day for Mana Kuratahi Nationals which will be held in Nelson in Term 4. On top of this, we were privileged to perform at the opening of Melissa Bank's special, and beautiful, exhibition on Kapa Haka at the Nelson Provincial Museum. This exhibition will be on until the middle of November. Head along!





Te Whānau Aorere

With the end of the term nearing, Te Whānau Aorere have been fully immersed in a variety of different activities. It has been exciting to learn our school haka, under the guidance of some Te Pītau Whakarei students. The progress been fantastic, and we are looking forward to competing against the other whānau at the end of the term.





We have also been in full swing with designing and constructing our kaitiaki masks. With each class having a different theme, it has been great to see ākonga take this and develop a mask that shows their personal understanding of the theme, and different pūrakau that sit alongside it. Ākonga are excited to showcase their final product at the beginning of Term 4.



Te Whānau Maitahi

In Week 7, Maitahi hosted the Kura Fortnightly Challenge. 'The H2O Challenge' involved passing water along a line of ākonga to fill a bucket.

Tamariki were challenged by having to perform various handovers. Everyone who participated had fun, and the spectators were well entertained.

Te Whānau Moketapu

As we move closer to the end of term students in Te Whānau Moketapu have been gearing up for the Haka Challenge. It has been a great chance to come together as a whānau more frequently to learn the action of our school haka "Whāia te ara tika."

In the beginning, many were unsure about the significance of our haka, but as we delved deeper into its history and meaning, they have understood the importance and strength of the school wide connection. The competition adds an extra layer of excitement, as the upcoming event looms on the last day of this term.



During these times we have also celebrated achievement through class awards and values badges which ākonga continue to collect and earn.



Te Whānau Wairepo

What does Whānau Sport look like in Wairepo?

Every Thursday afternoon, Te Whānau Wairepo meet under the trees for a hui. We celebrate ākonga achievements - and then we head into sport.

For the first 6 or 7 weeks of the Term, ākonga stay in their own class groups but rotate each week to a different Wairepo kaiako for a new sport. Then, for the last few weeks of the term, ākonga are given 3-5 sports they can choose from.



We have noticed that our ākonga are really excelling in the way the participate in Whānau Sport. They work well together in teams and many ākonga are able to organise and referee games themselves - agreeing on rules and making sure the games are played fairly. These skills are not just great for sports but also help create a friendly and cohesive whānau environment. Student Attendance

You may have recently heard the discussion in the media regarding attendance rates of ākonga in Aotearoa New Zealand. In response to the falling attendance rates across the country, the Ministry of Education has invested heavily in services to support students to come to school regularly. They have also set some attendance targets for schools to meet.

The MOE defines regular attendance to be attendance which is greater than 90%. National data indicates that fewer than 60% of ākonga attend school regularly. This means in 10 years of school over 40% of ākonga in Aotearoa will miss more than one year of schooling.

Please get in touch with your child's kaiako if you feel that it is becoming challenging to get your child to school. We are more than happy to discuss how we can put some supports in place to ensure regular attendance occurs.

CYBERSAFETY

As ākonga move through Intermediate many look to engage with one another through social media platforms.

It is not unusual for children to need support to keep themselves safe while online. Some key pieces of advice that we have heard from experts in the field include:

- Not allowing devices in bedrooms and limiting time spent online
- Setting up the account together
- Using your email instead of your child's
- Entering their actual birthday so they're less likely to see inappropriate content.

'Creatives in Schools' Mural Project

In Week 6 Hamuera Manihera Robb, an Educator from the Nelson Provincial Museum, came to kōrero with our 'Creatives in Schools' Artist Nerys Ngaruhe and ākonga to add to our knowledge of iwi pūrākau related to the important places in our school pepeha: Moketapu, Maitahi, Te Wairepo, and Aorere. These 4 important local geographical features are also the names of our school whānau groups and make up our 'Creatives in Schools' mural design.

In Week 7 our mural project students investigated traditional Toi Māori designs and used carving tools to make their own printing blocks.







In Week 8 we started spray painting our mural. In the mural, Moketapu (our mountain) is represented by the colour yellow, Maitahi (our river) is represented by the colour green, Te Wairepo (the stream that runs through our kura) is represented by the colour purple, and Aorere (our sea) is represented by the colour orange.

The sun was out and students enjoyed working on the mural all day with Nerys, with some whanau joining us after school too. Ka pai tō mahi everyone. We look forward to seeing the finished artwork soon!








